friends and meeting new people.*



Option 1: Make a scrapbook ! Discover your ancestors & family occupations

Occupations & jobs people in your family had, will provide clues about your ancestors' daily lives and their personalities.

Wondering how to get started? Start your research with your parents , other relatives and ask them to tell you what they do or did for a living. Scrapbooking is a fun way to tell your family story, so why not make your own?

Begin your heritage scrapbook project by gathering together as many photographs as possible, from boxes, attics, old albums, and relatives. These photos don't necessarily need to have just people in them - pictures of old houses, automobiles, and towns are great for adding historical interest to your family's occupation scrapbook .You'll be proud to share it with your family and friends.

Don't forget to consider and include relatives too and ***You should you have an idea of what you want to become!***


Tip: Your last name can tell you about your ancestor's job.

WHAT TO DO:


This option challenges creative young writers like you to share your travelling adventures of **"How I explored....."**

Calling all budding young photographers – The Chace Junior Photographer of the Year competition is back and bigger than ever!




Do you love taking photos? Are you excited about the way the world works? Then this option is right up your street!

Option 5:

Chace new *Mission to Mars*.


As one of our young engineer blast off on an amazing space adventure... **Design and construct** a model which is an integral part of our space mission, include astronauts' tools, a space shuttle and satellites, plus realistic lights and sounds.

Gather up your intrepid explorers....
