KS4 Long Term Curriculum Plan: English Literature Year 10 2024 - 2025

Curriculum Aim: The curriculum is a two year course that prepares students for two GCSE qualifications: English Language and English Literature. The units that teach English Language knowledge and skills will enable students of all abilities to develop the skills they need to read, understand and analyse a wide range of different texts covering the 19th, 20th and 21st century time periods as well as to write clearly, coherently and accurately using a range of vocabulary and sentence structures. The units that teach English Literature content take a skills-based approach to the study of English literature that is consistent across the genres. The two qualifications are fully co-teachable and Chace students greatly benefit from the transferable skills learnt across the two subjects.

<u>Link to prior learning:</u> We teach a spiral curriculum that ensures that we consistently revisit the key strands of the curriculum in order to consolidate and develop students' skills in prose, plays and poetry.

Rationale of sequencing: We begin with 'Macbeth' as it builds on the skills and knowledge taught in the penultimate unit of Year 9. Our spiral curriculum then ensures that we consistently revisit the key strands of the curriculum in order to consolidate and develop students' skills in prose, plays, poetry, nonfiction and spoken language in preparation for their GCSE examinations.
