## EXAMINATION TIMETABLE FOR SUMMER

Students have already received a draft copy of their personalised exam timetable.

Please can you ensure that your son/daughter has checked his/her timetable carefully to ensure they are entered for all the correct subjects and tiers of entry. If there is a clash on the timetable Ms Dooling, the Exams Officer, will discuss the scheduling with your son/daughter and issue a new timetable.

The first exam is Art on the 10<sup>th</sup> May and the first whole school exam is RE on 14<sup>th</sup> May. Students will be expected to attend school as normal until May half term. Students are expected to attend normal lessons if they do not have exams. After half term students will have a bespoke timetable to support them in preparing for the remaining exams.

Please ensure that your child has all relevant equipment (i.e. black pens, ruler, pencils, scientific calculator etc...) for every exam in a clear pencil case.

### Exam Preparation

I am delighted that so many students attended the revision sessions during the February half term. Attached are the revision sessions planned for the remainder of the year. Please encourage your son/daughter to attend as many as possible.

We are very pleased to offer the opportunity for students to attend a seminar from Elevate Education on how to 'Ace your Exams'. This seminar outlines the critical exam skills that will allow them to excel in the exam room, whilst also demonstrating that exams are not just about the exam room - the preparation is where the marks are. The skills to be covered in the session are:

1. Exam room techniques
2. Allocation of time
3. Fixing mistakes
4. Effective work

The seminar is taking place on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> March from 8.50am to 10.40am during lesson time.



# Exam Stress

With the exam period about to start we have been working with students to help them manage their work load, anxiety and stress.

## Exam Stress



Everyone gets stressed during exams but it's important not to let it get out of control.

### Stress Symptoms

Look out for prolonged or extreme cases of the following if you feel the work's piling up:

- Difficulty getting to sleep or difficulty waking up in the morning
- Constant tiredness
- Forgetfulness
- Unexplained aches and pains
- Poor appetite
- Loss of interest in activities
- Increased anxiety and irritability
- Increased heart rate
- Migraines/headaches
- Blurred vision
- Dizziness

If you've noticed three or more of the above symptoms and you've experienced them for a few weeks you may need to do something about your stress levels.



Don't lose sight of the fact that there is life after exams

### Exams... lck

A little bit of stress can be a good thing as it motivates us to knuckle down and work hard. But exams can make stress levels get out of hand, which can stop us from performing our best. So it's important to address it and get it back under control.

### How to manage exam stress

- Learn to recognise when you're stressing out. A break or a chat with someone who knows the pressure you're under will get things into perspective.
- Avoid comparing your abilities with your mates. Those "Oh my God I've only read Macbeth 17 times" conversations are such a wind up. Everyone approaches revision in different ways, so just make sure you've chosen the method that works best for you. Make a realistic timetable. Stick to it.
- Eat right. Treat yourself like a well honed machine - eat fresh fruit and veg and have a proper breakfasts. Fuel your brain as well as your body - no one can think straight on coffee and chocolate.
- Sleep well. Wind down before bed and don't revise under the duvet - your bed is a sanctuary, not a desk. Get your eight hours.
- Exercise. Nothing de-stresses the mind faster than physical activity, so build it into your timetable. Being a sloth makes our mind sloppy too.
- Quit the bad habits. Cigarettes and alcohol never stopped anyone being stressed for very long.
- Panic is often triggered by hyperventilating (quick, shallow breaths). So if you feel yourself losing it during the exam, sit back for a moment and control your breathing. Deep breath in and out through the nose, counting to five each way.
- Steer clear of any exam 'post-mortem'. It doesn't matter what your mate wrote for Question 3(b), it's too late to go back and change your answers, so it will just make you worry even more.

Ultimately, don't lose sight of the fact that there is life after exams. Things might seem intense right now, but it won't last forever.

Further to this, I am delighted that three of our Year 10 students have been successful in their applications to be accepted on the Easter programme with the RVC. We are planning for them to deliver a session to Year 7s, 8s and 9s on 19th April in the Library after school about their experience as I was inundated with Year 7s wanting to attend. However the pitch of the sessions was KS4/5 based. Please ask your son/daughter to attend the session on 19th April in the Library if they are interested. This will be mainly for Years 7 to 9, but all students are welcome.

# Uniform and Standards



Thank you for all your support in keeping the high standards of uniform over this academic year. With the warm weather arriving could you please continue to support us in ensuring students have jackets on cold days.

After Easter, hoodies will be confiscated on arrival at the gates and returned at the end of the day in the first instance, with persistent offenders having them confiscated for longer periods.

There is also a significant increase in the use of headphones. These will also be confiscated if they are not put away when asked immediately or if students continue to use them and need further reminders to put them away.

We are adding headphones and ear pieces to the minor infringements in the Positive Behaviour Policy, so headphones / ear pieces will be in line with our phone rule, which is, if seen they will be confiscated and returned the same day unless students refuse to hand them over or are not cooperative when spoken to.

Finally please ensure your son/daughter has appropriate footwear. If there is a medical reason for not having the correct footwear please ensure that they have a note explaining if there is new medical information we need to be aware of. # Science Trip to Paris—February 2018

Some of our students in Year 9 were very lucky to be able to visit the Cité des Sciences et de l'industrie in Paris during the half term break. The purpose of the trip was for students to get an understanding of the science principles they have been taught in class and see some of them in action. The group of 40 students and accompanying staff marvelled at the range of exhibits on show. These included the Solar Impulse 1 aircraft that flew across America in 2013, exhibits based on the Homeostasis system, Sound and Light as well as a large Geode located in the grounds.

The group then made their way to Disneyland Paris where they experienced the effect of rollercoasters on the human body and the science behind some of the attractions.

The whole party really enjoyed themselves and the students were worthy ambassadors of the school.



# Safer Internet Day—6 February 2018

You may have noticed in our February Bulletin a feature advising students how to gradually stop depending on social media as part of a seven-day Digital Detox. We took this message further during a recent Year 7 assembly and demonstrated to students and their form tutors the positive effect of being “offline”.

In addition, our Digital Eagle, Moska from Year 9, enlightened her audience by demonstrating how much time it would take a hacker to decode a simple password and a complex password. Judging from the brief murmurs in the background, this took most students and their form tutors by surprise.

Moska demonstrated how to create a complex password, so that users can improve the protection level of their information, whether it's a simple login to the computer network or viewing emails.

By having a complex password, you can ensure a safer computing experience knowing that your information is better protected. Try combining two words together, intermixed with numbers and special characters, such as £, \$, %, ^ or &.

## Community Learning

This year Chace is working closely with a number of local primary schools through Enfield Town Schools' Partnership. The Partnership is looking at a number of ways to support transition and learning opportunities for both students and parents. Later this year a poetry workshop for Year 10 and a science day has been organised. Parents might be interested in the courses available through the partnership:

**Paediatric First Aid courses for parents: 6 week courses starting Wednesday 18th April at Carterhatch Infants (pm) and Worcesters (am) and starting Friday 20th April at Bush Hill Park (am) and Eastfield (pm).**

**Introduction to Counselling Skills and Theory (Level 1) at Capel Manor Primary starting Tuesday 20th March. The course will be completed over 12 weeks. Each session will run from 9.00am – 12.00pm.**
