KS5 Long Term Curriculum Plan: Year 13 A Level Politics (Edexcel Specification)

Curriculum Aim:

The Edexcel A Level in Politics will enable learners to:

- develop knowledge and an informed understanding of contemporary political structures and issues in their historical context globally. develop a critical awareness of the changing nature of politics and the relationships between political ideas, institutions and processes. develop knowledge and an informed understanding of the influences and interests which have an impact on decisions in government and politics. develop knowledge and an informed understanding of the rights and responsibilities of individuals and groups.
- develop the ability to critically analyse, interpret and evaluate political information to form arguments and make judgements.
- develop an interest in, and engagement with, contemporary politics.

*Students will also be confident in applying the 3 assessment skills needed to succeed in the course, namely AO1 (to demonstrate knowledge and understanding of political institutions, processes, concepts, theories and issues), AO2 (Analysis of aspects of politics, including in relation to parallels, connections, similarities and differences) and AO3 (Evaluation of aspects of politics, including to construct arguments and make substantiated judgements).

<u>Link to prior learning:</u> The Edexcel A Level in Politics will build on the knowledge, understanding and skills established in a range of Humanities subjects studied at KS4, particularly History with the historical background of the UK political system (see Year 12 Long term plan), Sociology with Voting Behaviour (see Year 12 long term plan) and Geography with the global politics component.

Rationale of sequencing:

Having studied Component 1 (UK Political issues) and Component 2 (UK Government) students are expected in Year 13 to develop a more complex, global understanding in their studies as they complete Component 3 (Global issues) making synoptic links with the UK-focused components they completed in Year 12.
