KS3 Long Term Curriculum Plan: English/Year 9 2023-2024

<u>Curriculum Aim: The Chace English curriculum aims to ensure that all pupils acquire a wide vocabulary, an understanding of grammar and knowledge of linguistic conventions for reading, writing and spoken language. Our text choices enable our students to appreciate our rich and diverse literary heritage and have a chance to develop culturally, emotionally, intellectually and socially. We also aim to empower pupils to write clearly, accurately and coherently, adapting their language and style in and for a range of contexts, purposes and audiences. The curriculum encourages the use of discussion in order to learn so pupils should be able to elaborate and explain clearly their understanding and ideas. It ensures that they are competent in the arts of speaking and listening, making formal presentations, demonstrating to others and participating in debate.</u>

Link to prior learning:

The Year 9 curriculum builds on the skills developed during the yr 8 curriculum by exposing students to a range of different forms of literature and nonfiction reading and writing.

Rationale of sequencing: We teach a spiral curriculum that ensures that we consistently revisit the key strands of the curriculum in order to consolidate and develop students' skills in prose, plays, poetry, nonfiction and spoken language. The texts chosen for study become more challenging in language, structure and content as the KS3 curriculum progresses.
